The Northwest Indian College Space Center was started by students Robert Skaggs and Kyle Koos and instructor Gary Brandt as an idea to demonstrate practical uses for some of the electronics that other students built in NWIC's robotics and electronics classes. We decided upon water bottle rockets because of the no-cost feature and they can be built from everyday recyclable materials. We decided to call ourselves the Northwest Indian College Space Center.

The Space Center is a recognized NWIC student organization with a Board of Directors consisting of two of NWIC's administrators and four faculty members. The Space Center holds weekly rocket launches at the ball field next to NWIC, usually on Thursdays, weather permitting.

Then the First Nations Rocket Launch came to our attention during mid December 09. Gary emailed them asking to be put on the mailing list for the next one because this launch project had been in progress since October. The reply from them was to join the other Tribal Colleges in the competition and that the Space Center could be brought up-to-date. We decided to take part in the first ever Tribal rocket launch competition to be held at Menominee Nation College in Green Bay, Wisconsin during the first weekend of May 2010.

The College of Menominee Nation, along with sponsors NASA and the Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium will be hosting the first ever tribal college high-powered rocket competition at Richard Bong Recreational Area in Wisconsin on **May 1, 2** 2010.

The flight competition parameters are to launch a high-powered rocket carrying an on-board scientific payload. The rocket must successfully deploy a drogue parachute at apogee and a main parachute at approximately 600 feet above ground level. The rocket must land safely with little or no damage. The Tribal Rocket Team that flies their rocket closest to their predicted altitude will win the flight portion of the competition.

THERE IS NO EXPERIENCE NECESSARY! To help prepare for the competition, we are hosting two workshops at the CMN Green Bay campus. The first two-day First Nations Launch (FNL) Workshop is being held October 24-25, 2009 at College of Menominee Nation, Green Bay Campus in Wisconsin. The second workshop is a repeat of the first and will be held December 12-13, 2009. The workshops are designed to give tribal college faculty and students the necessary tools to successfully launch and recover a high-powered rocket.

FNL workshops will show students how to design, simulate, and build rocket components needed to compete in the First Nations Launch Competition held April 23-24, 2010 at Richard Bong Recreational Area in Wisconsin. It is not necessary to attend a workshop to compete in the launch competition, but it is recommended that at least one team member attend a workshop. We will help you find additional funding if necessary.

The October workshop registration deadline is October 2, 2009. Please visit the website below for registration, workshop, and launch information.
